Rockford, IL aka Forest City! (three sizes of flying geese)



- This is our second 24" block
- It consists of four 12" square subunits
- Each subunit consists of 3 sizes of flying geese
 - o small, medium and large.

FABRIC:

Rockford IL is also known as Forest City, so for this block we are making Evergreen Trees.

You will need a background fabric, and your focus fabric (or three focus fabrics, one for each size of flying geese unit)

You can choose to make your trees green (like I did, using three green fabrics) but, as a father once told his daughter when they were coloring together, I think a Green Sun is AWESOME, so make your trees whatever color pleases you!



CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS:



- LARGE FLYING GEESE:
 - FOCUS FABRIC: CUT ONE 13 ¼" SQUARE
 - BACKGROUND FABRIC: CUT FOUR 7" SQUARES
- MEDIUM FLYING GEESE:
 - FOCUS FABRIC: CUT ONE 9 ¼" SQUARE
 - O BACKGROUND FABRIC:
 - CUT FOUR 5" SQUARES
 - CUT EIGHT 2 ½" X 4 ½" RECTANGLES
- SMALL FLYING GEESE:
 - FOCUS FABRIC: CUT ONE 5 ¼" SQUARE
 - BACKGROUND FABRIC:
 - CUT FOUR 3" SQUARES
 - CUT EIGHT 2 ½" X 4 ½" RECTANGLES

SEWING INSTRUCTIONS: (these instructions will apply to each set of four flying geese)

1. Place two smaller squares in opposite corners of the larger square, right sides together. Draw a diagonal line, corner to corner, through both of the smaller squares. Place pins along the line to keep fabric from shifting






2. Using a scant ¼" seam allowance, sew on each side of the line you drew.

Cut apart along the drawn line

Press the small squares open

(you will have a pointy heart shape).







- 3. Line up your last two small squares on the bottom of each of the heart shapes, right sides together. As before, draw a diagonal line across the back of the small squares.
- 4. Sew along each side of your drawn lines, again using a scant ¼" seam allowance. Cut apart on the line.

- 5. Press open. (You will have 4 of each size)
- 6. Trim the flying geese:

TRIM large geese to 12 ½" X 6 ½"

TRIM medium geese 8 ½" X 4 ½"

TRIM small geese to 4 1/2" X 2 1/2 "





7. Sew Background rectangles (4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ") to each side of the small and medium flying geese (as shown).

- 8. Layout 1 each of large, medium, and small goose blocks to form one 12 ½" subunit of the 24" block.
- 9. Sew the rows together
- 10. Square to 12 1/2" square
- 11. Decide on the arrangement for your block and sew the subunits together to make a 24 ½" unfinished block
